MICHIGAN LEGISLATION AFFECTS LIONS CLUBS COLLECTING FUNDRAISERS IN THE STREETS IN MICHIGAN

By now many of you have heard that efforts for getting legal collection of funds in the road and road right-a-ways has past the Michigan House and is on its way to the Michigan Senate. Many are anticipating that the trip to the Senate should be a short one and then either back to the House or the Governor's desk for a signature. The passage in the House was by a huge majority. If this all comes off as it should, this will be a huge victory. This is a victory for all the Lions Clubs and other benevolent organizations that fundraise in the streets. In the State of Michigan this amounts to more than a million dollars of aid to people in need from Lions alone. It should be noted that this success took a considerable amount of fortitude from the current Council of Governor's. At times, this was a very emotional topic. In the end the Council along with many of the people who were struggling with the street collection policies agreed that we did the right thing. The Council took the approach of working together with all of the organizations both for and against the proposal. The goal was to bring about a law that fairly meets the needs of everyone in the State. Our Michigan Lions Foundation contributed a grant to help expedite the cause.

P.S. This legislation came about because the Michigan Attorney General indicated that collecting money in the streets for fundraisers was not in compliance with the Michigan Vehicle Code. Many Lions Clubs and first responder have done this for years without a major accident occurring. This opinion cut off much needed revenue for many organizations.



It doesn't matter what civic or community group you are a part of, membership is now and has always been an important issue. Not as viable, but just as important, is retention. Lately, retention has been brought into the spotlight. Some clubs have successful membership drives, and this is great because their numbers go up, but only temporarily. We lose members every year through death, relocation, and lack of interest. No one has discovered a cure for death, because we are all mortal and we all have an expiration date. If a Lion receives a job offer, which requires him/her to relocate, your club loses a member. The sculpture is made of mirrored stainless steel. The circular top of the sculpture represents the world that "We Serve". The steep sides of the sculpture represent the "New Mountains to Climb" for Lions in the coming years. Lion Bill indicated that we will require some changes in our approach to solve new problems and the structure of the Lions is to promote change. Our new Centennial years will require New Ideas for a Better World. The copper time capsule will be filled with pertinent items by the Lions of Michigan personnel and then sealed. It is scheduled to be reopened 100 years from 2017. Lion Bill designed the sculpture and time capsule. The items were fabricated by the Sheet Metal Workers of Local 80 and their Training Center in Warren, Michigan. 


Lions Clubs Centennial Silver Dollar Coin
