He relied on his untested ability to learn an assembly line job with no job experience. Other men, he told me, on the line helped him gain the experience to do his job. Later in life, as he told my brohher and sister his hard story I realized how much it hurt him to have to tell a lie to put food on their table.

I tell this true story because many of our citizens in our communities are facing unemployment and I'm sure many of these people are facing loss of their home and inability to care for their families. We Lions need to support the basic needs for these families in their desperate times by sharing our philanthropic endeavors whatever they may be. Even kind words and the minimum of assistance can ease the pain of the heart and mind. Like my dad's generation the men and women today can help those families survive in their harsh times. Our motto "We Serve" has never been more important than it is right now.

FAMILY & WOMEN'S MEMBERSHIP NEWS

Lions International offers many avenues to make membership in our organization affordable. Is your club aware of the **STUDENT MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM?**

If your club is fortunate enough to have members that are between the ages of 18 and 30 year s of age, and they are enrolled in at least 1 credit hour in any type of college class, they qualify for receiving their International dues at half price! That is a savings of \$19.50. This includes members in all types of clubs, whether a traditional club or a campus club. The benefit of having these younger members in your club means bringing new energy and fresh ideas into your community. Let's all look for this type of prospective member and give our clubs an energy boost!

The **FAMILY MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM** has been around for a while now, since January of 2007. It allows for one head of household to pay full members dues, plus initiation fee. After that one family member joins, up to four additional members, all with the same residence may join at a reduced rate, plus their initiation fee is waved. This is a great way to get the whole family volunteering together, sharing valuable time together all while giving back to the community. A good suggestion to spark interest in this program would be to ask spouse or children of y our current members to help at a service project or fundraiser. Try to match the project to one's interest, exposing them to the world of serving others while spending valuable time with their loved ones.

Did you know that 14.5% of all new Lions join under the FAMILY MEMBERSHIP PROGRAM? Last year that represented 9,468 new members!

There were over 4,000 new Lions clubs last year that contained family memberships, for a total of 13,837 family friendly clubs!

WOMEN IN LIONISM are steadily growing in numbers! The current number of women members, effective October 2008 is 260,824, that is an increase of 5,485 from the start of the year. World wide, women make up

19.9% of all Lions. Did you know that the first woman Lion elected as a District Governor was fro m France in 1991?

One way to attract women to join would be to identify a need in your community that would stimulate female interest. Set up a service project or fund raiser that would meet the need. Ask for help from community members who would be interested in helping. When they see what Lions are all about, chances are you'll have gained some new women members in your club.

International is offering an award for clubs with an overall gain in women membership during the 2008-2009 year. Our own District Governor will be presenting special recognition at the District Convention in April to clubs who have met the challenge to grow in female membership.

Lions International has several great publications to promote all the types of members. They are pocket size, with many vibrant photos depicting family and women serving as Lion volunteers. If you would like some for your club, please feel free to contact mm, as I have a supply on hand, or contact the supply department to order them direct at no cost.

In closing, as I've visited more than half the clubs in our district, I've found we still have clubs that have not stepped up to the plate, accepting women into their clubs. This is a tragic loss of ideas, energy and talent that women can bring to a club. My challenge to all is to look around and seek out female members — you'll be glad you did!

Eyeglass Mission to Mexico


Our trip began in Grand Rapids, Michigan on Valentine's Day. After an 8 hour layover in Chicago, we departed for Mexico City. The other members of our team (17 in all) met us in Mexico City for the last leg of our journey to Comitan, Mexico. When we arrived in Comitan, the local Lions Club greeted us and we began to set up our clinic. In the next 4 days, we would see more than 2.365 men, women, and children. The oldest patient that I fit eyeglasses onto was 99 years old and she was very spry and nimble. I had the pleasure of fitting a pair of glasses onto a young school aged girl that were a minus 9.5 (they allowed her to finally see her textboks and homework) and the grateful smile on her f ace was enough to warm the heart of even the coldest person. Speaking of cold, the temperature at night was somewhere between 47 and 50 degrees. That didn't seem to bother the patients too much as they started lining up at 1:00 AM each night. They were bundled up in horse blankets, overcoats, and whatever else they could find to keep the cold winter air off of their bodies. This service project of the Comitan Lions Club had a two-fold purpose (each patient brought a small bag of rice, beans, or a bottle of cooking oil) which was later distributed to the needy in the area. As you can see by the large pile of food, everyone was able to benefit from this project. On our last day of the trip, we visited the "Gran Canyon" which had crocodiles, solid stone walls that reached over 1000 feet high, and a river that was 30 feet wide and over 130 feet deep. Unless otherwise specified herein, the affirmative vote of a majority of the delegates voting on any question shall be the act of the Convention.
